- ✓ positions require a job description
- √ must demonstrate competency
- ✓ must work within their scope of practice and licensure
- ✓ must have periodic evaluations of their job performance



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CMS Conditions for Coverage

§416.46
CONDITION
Nursing Services

"The ASC must ensure that the nursing service is directed under the leadership of an RN."

"Sufficient nursing staff with appropriate qualifications to assure the nursing needs of all ASC patients are met"

"Number and type of staff needed will depend on the volume and types of surgery the ASC performs"



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CMS Conditions for Coverage

§416.46 STANDARD Organization & Staffing




"Nursing services must be provided in accordance with recognized standards of practice"

- State laws for nursing practice (BRN scope of practice)
- Medical Board
- ✓ Professional Organizations (AORN, ANA)

"There must be a **Registered Nurse available for emergency treatment** whenever there is a patient
in the ASC"

- "available" = on the premises and sufficiently free from other duties that the nurse is able to respond rapidly in emergency situations"
- ✓ Designated RN must work within their scope of licensure or scope of practice





RN CIRCULATOR

Job Description

Responsible for delivery of safe, effective, and quality patient-family centered care in the OR and other areas of perioperative services for all patient populations







RNC is the Patient's legal representative while sedated



RN CIRCULATOR

Qualifications

MANDATORY

Bachelor's degree in Nursing

Graduate from an accredited school of nursing

Current registered nurse licensure in state of employment

Basic Life Support (BLS) certification

PREFERRED

2 years perioperative services experience

Certified Nurse, Operating Room (CNOR) certification

Advanced Cardiac Life Support (ACLS) certification

Pediatric Advanced Life Support (PALS) certification (patient population dependent)

Basic computer skills (e.g., Microsoft® Suite)



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RN Circulator Patient Safety



RN Circulators improve patient safety and outcomes by leading the team in *preventing*:

- Surgical site infections (SSI)
- Medication errors
- Wrong-site / Wrong-patient / Wrongprocedure surgeries
- Retained surgical items





RN Circulator Patient Safety





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RN Circulators are responsible for:

- Verifying pre-operative assessment
- Positioning the patient for surgery
- Initiating the surgical "Time Out" before surgery
- Documenting the nursing care during the procedure
- Monitoring and maintaining the sterile field to prevent surgical site infections

RN Circulator Patient Safety






RN Circulators are responsible for:

- Confirming the medications and blood products that are given to the patient
- Supervising ancillary personnel
- Making certain all equipment is functioning properly
- Communicating with other departments in the facility related to the patient's care
- Keeping the patient's family informed about the progress of surgery

Moderate/Conscious Sedation

Definition: Moderate sedation / analgesia is a drug-induced, mild depression of consciousness achieved by the administration of sedatives or a combination of sedatives and analgesic medications

Most often **delivered intravenously** and titrated to effect





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RNs and Moderate/Conscious Sedation

RNs administering moderate/conscious sedation must practice within the scope of nursing practice as defined by the state.

- Each state's BRN regulates which medications may be within the RN scope of practice (Ketamine, Propofol, Nitrous Oxide, Fentanyl, etc.)
- Consult with state BRN for rulings and other guidelines relating to RN's role as a provider of moderate sedation







RNs and

Moderate/Conscious Sedation

The RN administering/monitoring the patient receiving moderate sedation/analgesia should have no competing responsibilities.

Immediate response to any adverse reaction or complication





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GI Procedures

SGNA and **ASGE** Standards

Once the patient's level of sedation and vital signs are stable, the RN may perform minor, interruptible tasks (e.g., biopsy or polypectomy).

During moderate sedation, the GI registered nurse monitoring the patient may assist with minor, interruptible tasks once the patient's level of sedation/analgesia and vital signs have stabilized.

(ASA, 2002; Calderwood et. al, 2014)

Adequate monitoring of the patient's level of sedation must be maintained and continues into the post procedure phase of care.

(ASA, 2012; ASGE, 2008; Kochhar et al., 2016)

Staffing Requirements

Circulating RN

May be state mandated

Must be a person who is able to document care within their scope of licensure or practice

- Time Out
- · Use of Surgical Checklist

Monitoring RN

If needed, for sedation

Ancillary Staff

As needed



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Physician Orders

- Do not "check" off orders for physicians
- Ensure orders are signed / dated / timed prior to notation and implementation

MD Documentation

· H&P, Op Report

Scribing



Common Issues with RN Scope of Practice



Delegation of Duties

- Medication administration MA or NA administering eye drops
- LPN/LVN not directly supervised
- LPN/LVN not practicing within scope of licensure

- O Scrub Role
- O Delegated Tasks from RN







LVN / LPN Responsibilities

Delegated Tasks from RN

Focused Assessment	Medication Administration	IVs	Patient Education
Provided to RN for comprehensive assessment Vital Signs, Weight, BS	Typically, able to administer meds	May be able to assist with IVs Example Texas allows IV start/med administration following a training class except for PICC lines	Usually not involved with patient education Example Kentucky allows "educational activities" for clients based upon established written guidelines as delineated in a plan/strategy of care

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LVN / LPN Responsibilities

REQUIRES supervision by an RN

RN supervision level depends on type of facility*:

DIRECT	INDIRECT	AVAILABLE
ON SITE	ON SITE	OFF SITE
Immediately available	Available within 5 – 10 minutes	Available by phoneLocated within 30 minutes from clinical setting

^{*}ASCs require direct supervision due to nature of surgery requiring a higher level of need for assessment and response. SNF may be indirect.



Cannot substitute a LVN/LPN for an RN






